## Mark 16

## Lesson for Sunday, September 17, 2023

SUMMARY: Jesus rises from the grave, defeating death for all time, and ascends to heaven after giving His disciples the command to preach the Good News throughout the whole world.

- 1. He arises (vs. 1-18)
  - a. The resurrection announcement (vs. 1-8)
    - i. The grief (vs. 1-3)
    - ii. The glory (vs. 4-8)
  - b. The resurrection appearances (vs. 9-18)
    - i. First appearance to Mary Magdalene (vs. 9-11)
    - ii. Second appearance to two believers (vs. 12-13)
    - iii. Third appearance to the disciples as they are eating (vs. 14-18)
- 2. He ascends (vs. 19-20)

INTRODUCTION:

- $\Rightarrow$  We have finally made it to the end of Mark's Gospel. Discuss: What is one thing you have taken away from our study? *Allow for discussion...*
- $\Rightarrow\,$  Any time you finish reading something important the natural question ought to be, "So what?"
  - $\circ$  "In light of what I have read and learned, what should I do?"
  - This is especially true when we read the Bible.
- $\Rightarrow$  As we wrap up Mark, what is the "so what?" Good news: Jesus tells us!

## BIBLE STUDY: Point 3 is the heart of the lesson! Plan to spend the majority of your time there!

- 1. An Introduction to Jesus
  - a. Mark introduces us to the subject of his gospel in chapter 1, verse 1.
    - i. Mark was writing to a primarily Roman audience.
    - ii. His subject was clear: Jesus Christ, the Son of God.
  - b. Each of the four Gospels present the earthly life of the Lord Jesus Christ, but each provides a different view of Christ.
    - i. They were written by different men at different times.
    - ii. They were written for different audiences from different perspectives.
    - iii. In Matthew, Jesus is the Sovereign King.
    - iv. In Mark, Jesus is the Suffering Servant.
    - v. In Luke, Jesus is the Son of Man.
    - vi. In John, Jesus is the Son of God.
- 2. An Example to Emulate
  - a. Mark sets forth Christ as the Servant of Jehovah. The key verse being Mark 10:42-45.
    - i. Vs. 42: This is the world's way.
    - ii. Vs. 43-44: Jesus presents the principle of being a servant.
    - iii. Vs. 45: The illustration of Jesus Himself.
  - b. Jesus didn't just preach a message on being a servant, He became the chief Servant and example for us to emulate.
  - c. Discuss as a class: What examples of Jesus being a servant have we seen in our study of Mark? *Allow for discussion...*

- d. Jesus as a Servant is most obviously seen at the Cross.
- 3. A Commission to Obey
  - a. This brings us to the "so what."
  - b. Read together Mark 16:14-15, 19-20. In these verses we discover a pattern we are to still follow today:
  - c. First, we see the Lord had risen (vs. 14). "He appeared ... "
    - i. Can you imagine the response of the disciples? Three days earlier their dreams seemed to die, but here was Jesus standing in their presence.
    - ii. What do you think that did for the confidence of those early followers?
    - iii. We must never forget: Christ is risen! The tomb is still empty! That is the source of our hope!
    - iv. The world seems out of control and Christianity can seem to be losing, but Jesus is risen and on His throne. This fact alone should provide Christians with a perspective that stands in stark contrast to the world around us.
  - d. Second, we hear the Lord's commission (vs. 15).
    - i. The Great Commission is found in all four Gospels and in the book of Acts.
    - ii. In Mark's account, we find the most succinct recording, yet it is also the most comprehensive.
    - iii. Simply stated: Christ died for all and He desires that all know it.
    - iv. This is His command to every believer.
  - e. Third, we see the Lord's ascension (vs. 19).
    - i. This ought to remind us that we serve a living Savior!
    - This one fact alone separates Christianity from every other religion.
      Joseph Smith is dead (Mormons). Muhammad is dead (Islam). Buddha is dead. L Ron Hubbard is dead (Scientology).
    - iii. But Jesus is alive! Again, this ought to shape each Christian's perspective.
  - f. Finally, we see the disciple's obedience (vs. 20).
    - i. Think about it: The disciples took the logical next step.
    - ii. In light of all they had witnessed and seen, they obeyed.
    - iii. By Acts 17:6 the Christians are described as the ones "who have turned the world upside down."

## APPLICATION:

- $\Rightarrow$  What are we to do? Exactly what the disciples did.
- ⇒ It is the only logical thing to do. In light of what we have learned as we have worked through Mark's Gospel, why would we not obey Jesus?
- ⇒ Our goal this fall is +1: Each class taking personal responsibility to reach one more. It's more than a church goal, it is a matter of being obedient to the first thing Jesus commanded us to do!
- ⇒ Talk as a class about how you are doing in reaching 1, what you can do in the coming week(s), etc.
